Previous classes of AgLead and FarmLead were separate programs for two different age brackets. Three of their sessions were jointly conducted with the remaining sessions on their own. Beginning in 2018, the two programs have been combined into one AgLead–FarmLead class with both age groups equally represented. This next class is AgLead XIV-FarmLead VII.

AgLead—FarmLead members learn the intricacies of agribusiness, as well as the political and regulatory processes that influence their businesses at the state and national levels. AgLead—FarmLead places participants face-to-face with prominent decision-makers in Austin and in Washington, D.C. Through a greater understanding of the political process, they gain insight into regulations and politics—and learn how to influence the outcomes.

The comprehensive curriculum equips AgLead-FarmLead members with the latest industry information and connections to enhance both their businesses and the industry as a whole.

Farmers and ranchers hold a promising future for Texas. AgLead XIV–FarmLead VII will help you reach your full potential to lead from the farm gate to the Capitol steps—and everywhere in between.







PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS: A maximum of 20 participants will be selected for the program: 10 AgLead participants between the ages of 25-40 as of Dec. 31, 2018 and 10 FarmLead participants age 40 and above as of Dec. 31, 2018 will comprise the new AgLead XIV-FarmLead VII class. Preference is given to those who earn a major portion of their income from production agriculture. Prior to submitting an application, interested participants are to be approved by their county Farm Bureau Board of directors. The completed online application, an uploaded letter of support and sponsorship from the county Farm Bureau president and two uploaded recommendation letters must be submitted by Nov. 1, 2018.

GENERAL INFORMATION: Selected participants must provide a tablet or similar device for use in and out of scheduled sessions. Assignments outside of sessions—including meeting with elected officials, responding to action requests and speaking to local groups about agriculture and Texas Farm Bureau—are also a part of the program.

Class members are expected to attend each meeting unless an emergency, illness or similar situation arises. Each member must attend five of the six sessions to be eligible for the international trip.

PROGRAM COST: A portion of the AgLead-FarmLead experience is funded by joint contributions by each class member (\$1,000) and their sponsoring county Farm Bureau (\$1,000). Payments of \$500 by each selected applicant and county Farm Bureau are to be made by Feb. 28, 2019 and 2020. All other expenses—including travel, meals, lodging and other associated costs are either prepaid by Texas Farm Bureau or reimbursed upon submission of expense forms.
