Texas Farm Bureau Agriculture in the Classroom Outstanding Teacher Award

Deadline: Monday, September 15 at 5 p.m.

What is Ag in the Classroom?

Food, fiber, feed, and fuel. That's what agriculture produces. Food is one of the last shared experiences of every member of the human race. Not only is it essential that society understands food & fiber production, but it is also the perfect experience to give meaning to educational concepts, because every student is familiar with food and clothing. Agriculture offers context to the content.

Ag in the Classroom is a multifaceted approach to increase agricultural literacy across the state. Texas Farm Bureau wants to recognize and reward those teachers who go above and beyond in the classroom to increase the agricultural literacy of their students.

The Award –

One award will be presented to a classroom teacher for their creative efforts to teach students about the importance of agriculture. Teachers must utilize agricultural information and/or materials within their classroom curriculum. Learning activities may include, but are not limited to, an understanding of agriculture's impact on personal lives, our national heritage, the environment, our national security, and the economy. Innovative and interdisciplinary programs are encouraged.

Eligibility –

- Certified PK-12 classroom teachers who actively incorporate agriculture into curriculum
- Any content area is acceptable, with the exception of vocational agriculture
- Previous winners of the award are not eligible; however, teachers who have previously applied but weren't selected are encouraged to apply again

Selection –

All nominations will be evaluated by a panel of judges familiar with agriculture, education, and Agriculture in the Classroom. Judges may include one or more county Farm Bureau representatives; however, judges will not be selected from counties that have submitted a nomination.

Prizes –

The winning teacher will receive:

- \$1,500 cash award
 - Expenses paid to the 2025 Texas Farm Bureau Annual Meeting in Arlington, December 5-7
- *Please note attendance at the TFB Annual Meeting is mandatory to receive the award**



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- Expenses paid to the 2026 National Ag in the Classroom Conference
- Nomination for the National Ag in the Classroom Excellence in Teaching About Agriculture award

The county that nominates the winning teacher will receive:

- \$400 cash award
- Recognition on stage with the winning teacher at the TFB Annual Meeting

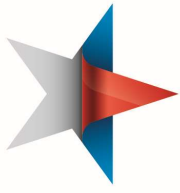
Submission –

- Each county Farm Bureau may nominate one teacher.
- **Deadline for applications (including nominations) is September 15, at 5 p.m.** County Farm Bureaus and applicants will be notified of judges' decision in early October

Summary

Please provide a summary of the agricultural learning activities and approach to using agricultural concepts in no more than 250 words, separate from narrative.

Narrative – (No more than 4 pages)

Share your method of integrating and instructing one or more of the following national agricultural literacy themes in your classroom. How did you use the theme (or themes) to increase agricultural literacy? Please note on the first line of your narrative which theme(s) you are addressing:

1. Agriculture and the Environment
2. Plants and Animals for Food, Fiber & Energy
3. Food, Health, and Lifestyle
4. Science, Technology, Engineering & Math
5. Culture, Society, Economy & Geography

Narrative will be evaluated on the clarity and apparentness of the following areas. Include all areas for maximum points.

- Creativity and utilization of agricultural concepts in numerous ways
- Cross-curricular approach – evidence of using agricultural concepts to tie together multiple content areas
- Standards based – are agricultural learning activities aligned with TEKS, NGSS, or other established education standards if teaching in a private school (please provide specific examples)
- Critical thinking – aspects which encourage problem-solving by learners for a deeper understanding of agriculture
- Student impact – evidence of students' increased agriculture literacy, can be through formal or informal evaluation or other means

Exemplary Lesson Plan – (No more than 6 pages)

Submit one lesson plan that illustrates your teaching methods that increases agricultural literacy among your students, as outlined in your narrative. Please cite sources when applicable.

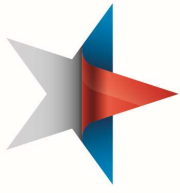
Evaluation Criteria:

- Use of standards-based, formal education practices
- Lesson includes opportunities for students to think critically and problem solve to gain a greater understanding of agriculture and the topics it relates to such as math, science, social studies, reading, etc.



Lesson Should Include:

- Applicant's name
- Title of the lesson
- Purpose of the lesson
- Audience (grade level)
- Time length of lesson
- Objective of lesson
- Standards addressed in lesson
 - TEKS (please no more than one-half page)
 - National Agricultural Literacy Outcomes

- Materials list
- Vocabulary
- Instructor Procedure
- Additional resources that enhance the lesson
